### **Letter to IDOT Regarding Alternative Signage for the Landscaped Terrace Walls**

On Saturday, October 3, during the Bridge Dedication, I had the opportunity to discuss with John Fortmann, District 1 Engineer for the Illinois Department of Transportation, about the possibility of adding our Village logos to the terrace walls in lieu of the name "Burr Ridge," which they have repeatedly rejected. Mr. Fortmann seemed to think that it was possible and, therefore, I sent a follow-up letter this week to him requesting that he consider this alternative (see attached).

### **Village Receives Wellness Program Rebate**

The Board will recall that we held a Wellness Health Fair and that, in order to incent employees to participate, we offered a \$100 incentive. Thirty-two employees participated and the total cost to the Village for the incentive was \$3,200. I am pleased to report that, as a result of this amount of participation, the Village met our insurance pool's Wellness Program requirements at Level B and the Village received a rebate in the amount of \$4,842.43. With this in mind, we will be participating in another Wellness Health Fair event with the City of Darien and the Village of Willowbrook on November 19 and will once again offer the \$100 incentive to participate.

### **DMMC Legislative Update**

#### **Coffee Break**

It was a beautiful morning for DMMC's fall *Coffee Break* with legislators. Thank you to all who took time from their busy schedules to participate, including Mayors Austin, Brummel, Craig, Lalmalani, Saverino, Smolinski, Tully, and Veenstra; Managers Barr, Coakley, Rush, and Stricker; and Trustee Krucek. We were joined by Representatives Bellock and Fortner, Senator Connelly, and Joanne Ruty, Aide to Representative Winger.

#### **Legislative Calendar**

The General Assembly was not in Springfield this week. Both chambers are expected to return on Tuesday, October 20, and also November 10 and a date to be determined in December for veto session. DMMC will solicit members for potential small group, Targeted Springfield Drive Downs during veto session, so please keep an eye out for additional emails.

#### **Local Use Tax Withheld**

As you may have heard, local Use Tax revenue that has been collected since July 1 is now being withheld in addition to MFT, wireless 9-1-1 surcharge, video gaming, and casino revenues. Distributions of Use Tax revenue to local governments were stopped in September. IML met with the Department of Revenue last week and was informed that without a FY 2016 budget, the state lacks the appropriation authority necessary to distribute Use Tax revenue. Several bills have been filed which would require the state

to distribute some or all of these revenue sources to local governments. The most recent, HB 4305, was filed by Representative Moylan (D-Des Plaines), but the General Assembly does not return to Springfield until October 20.

**Survey - Local Government Consolidation and Unfunded Mandates Task Force**

The Task Force met for the ninth time on September 30, 2015 and heard from a number of speakers on shared services. The Task Force also received an update from Dr. Norm Walzer about the progress the Center for Governmental Studies at Northern Illinois University has made in surveying local governments to identify burdensome unfunded mandates. The survey for municipalities will only be available until Wednesday, October 14. The Center shared the survey with IML, which has posted [additional information and a link to the survey here](#).

We look forward to your positive response. In the meantime, if you have any questions, please contact me at (630) 654-8181, ext. 2000.



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### City of Naperville and Village of Bartlett Win at DMMC Municipal Innovation Celebration

Congratulations go to the City of Naperville for winning the award for "Best Innovation" at the second annual DMMC Municipal Innovation Celebration on Wednesday, September 16, 2015. Sixteen municipalities competed for this prestigious title, presenting their innovative and creative ideas for saving time, solving problems, and bringing value to their communities and residents. Secret ballots were cast by those present for "Best Innovation" and "Best Presentation."

Naperville won "Best Innovation" for the Naperville Fire Department's Alternate Response/Rescue Vehicle (ARV) program, a program designed to more efficiently deliver appropriate resources to non-emergency calls.

The Naperville Fire Department has two rescue vehicles which are each staffed, as staffing allows, by one firefighter or firefighter/paramedic trained to respond to non-emergency calls. When such a call comes in, the ARV responds, allowing other emergency vehicles and personnel to be available for higher priority emergency incidents at the same time. Prior to the program, emergency vehicles on the scene of the non-emergency incident could either be delayed in responding to a higher priority emergency or require the assistance of another department. The ARV program increases reliability, reduces fuel use and costs, decreases vehicle maintenance costs, keeps fire suppression units available in their districts for emergency calls, and increases public safety by reducing the number of times a suppression unit is put on the street. Naperville Fire Chief Mark Puknaitis received the award for "Best Innovation" on behalf of Naperville.





Congratulations also go to the Village of Bartlett for winning "Best Presentation." Jim Plonczynski, Bartlett Director of Community Development, thrilled the audience by presenting Bartlett's innovative Gravesite Finder while dressed as the Grim Reaper. The Bartlett Cemetery Gravesite Finder allows visitors to the cemetery to access gravesite information through the online application on the Village's website. The application permits people to more easily find the gravesite of a loved one and saves time for Public Works staff.

Special thanks to our other participants, Addison, Aurora, Bensenville, Burr Ridge, Downers Grove, Elmhurst, Glen Ellyn, Hanover Park, Lisle, Oak Brook, Schaumburg, Villa Park, Warrenville, and Woodridge, for

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## Exploring Alternatives to the Motor Fuel Tax (MFT)

Lindsay Hollander, Senior Policy Analyst at CMAP, gave a presentation at DMMC's Transportation Technical Committee on possible alternatives to the State Motor Fuel Tax (MFT). There is growing concern that continued reliance on the MFT is not an appropriate long-term solution for transportation funding. To provide adequate revenue for modernizing and expanding the region's transportation system, CMAP's GO TO 2040 plan recommends implementing new and enhanced sources of transportation revenues, including a long-term replacement for the MFT. CMAP has initiated an analysis of state MFT alternatives and summarized recent findings in an issue brief. The brief explores MFT replacements implemented by other states and assesses several possible MFT replacement options using common tax policy considerations. Alternatives evaluated include mileage-based user fees, motor fuel sales taxes, and motor vehicle registration fees. While the CMAP analysis evaluates each approach, it does not make specific recommendations for the State of Illinois. On July 30th several Public Works representatives from the DMMC member municipalities gathered as a part of the Public Works Committee meeting. As a part of this meeting, corporate partner [FER-PAL Construction LLC](#). briefed the attendees on upcoming changes to the Illinois Department of Natural Resources' water loss rules. As a part of their seminar, FER-PAL also discussed possible technologies to help monitor water loss and stop leaks and breaks from occurring. The technologies included new municipal water meters as well as structural water main rehabilitation through Cured-In-Place Piping (CIPP).
